

In 1955 the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial Commission established guidelines for prospective designers to look to "the character and work of Franklin D. Roosevelt to give us the theme of a memorial that will do him the honor he deserves and transmit his image to future generations." Designed by Lawrence Halprin (pictured above), noted San Franciscan landscape (Bart and Vallco) architect, the FDR Memorial is one of the most expansive memorials in the nation.

Since 1978, Jeri Sulley has worked as a slide archivist for Lawrence Halprin. Her presentation will not only include slides of the memorial, but also a discussion on how the design was decided upon.

President's Message

I have assumed the Office of President and Devereaux Rendler, the Office of Vice President, to complete the 1999-2000 term of office, because of the resignations of Beez Jones and John Kolski last month. We thank Beez and John for their generous time and other commitments to the Cupertino Historical Society and Museum. From my view, the Society and Museum has been doing an excellent job in fulfilling its mission and accomplishing its purposes, with limited financial resources – through the dedication of its part time professional staff and all the other volunteer people who make up the active membership. I want to give particular recognition to the three staff people who are doing so much:

- Roberta Zentner, Volunteer Coordinator
- Corinna Schoenfelder, Registrar

I will not, in my first message as President, attempt to outline all that is being done by the many volunteers. When the activities are listed, it is apparent more is being done than most realize. I have taken the time to visit our two museum exhibits at Quinlan Community Center and Vallco Fashion Park. I highly recommend a visit and viewing in depth to anyone who has not seen both exhibits. You will enjoy the local history and items on display, and be impressed by the professional presentation of both exhibits which display property of the Historical Society and Museum.

Unfortunately the costs to do the quality job which has been done is more than we have been able to fund through membership donations, an annual fund drive, and grants from all other sources. The City of Cupertino provided some special funding 2 years ago, which did help to pay the staff salaries necessary to have professional quality museum exhibits and displays, and to preserve the collection. The Board has commenced the process to seek modest funding assistance from the City, to continue the museum, historical exhibits and displays for the benefit of the community.

THE CHS ENDOWMENT FUND: WHAT IS IT? WHY IS IT NEEDED?


"Endowment Fund...a fund derived from donations where the principle is never used and the interest is paid for a steady, reliable income stream."

In order for the Cupertino Historical Society to look forward to a viable future, it must have funds to continue our work to preserve the history of Cupertino.

In 1997 the Ryder Family, in memory of Jeannie Ryder, gave a generous donation to the Society. That donation gave impetus to start an endowment fund. Since that date our fund has grown from the original \$10,000 gift to over \$18,000!

As the fund grew, the Board of Directors decided that the fund should be housed with an agency that is in the business of dealing with growing endowment funds. From late 1998 through early 1999, the Board investigated foundations and banks before deciding to place the fund with the Community Foundation/Silicon Valley (CF/SV).

Placing our fund with CF/SV enables us to take advantage of their much larger pool of investment assets and their greater investment expertise. Among the many other benefits are the opportunity to: invest endowed funds in a broader range of investment vehicles; receive a higher rate of return; bring CHS to the attention of new donors; receive management and all legal and tax reporting for a low annual fee.



The Museum display case at The Cupertino National Bank on Stevens Creek houses a new exhibit. An extensive collection of ladies purses (beaded, chain mail, and crochet, just to name a few) are accompanied by gloves, muffs and other fanciful accessories.

Thank you Frances and Phil Bush for installing this collection.

CF/SF is the nation's fastest growing foundation and continues to "employ a progressive investment policy to preserve the endowment's capital." By joining the CF/SV your board of directors is looking toward a solid future for CHS.

Thanks to our many members, friends, and families our endowment fund is growing. A recent \$5,000 donation from the Miriam Stelling Trust was greatly appreciated. Our first goal is to reach \$25,000. We are well on our way.


Memorial Day is held in honor of members of the armed forces killed in battle. This May 29th, I wish to perpetuate rememberance of Cupertino's first casualty of World War II.

William Ralph Faria

William Ralph Faria was born on January 23, 1923. At the age of two his family moved from Hayward to Cupertino. Faria was raised in Cupertino, attending Cupertino Union School, where he was elected elementary student body president, Fremont High School, where he served as a member of the track team and as the class president of '41, and San Jose State University. As a student, 'Bill' was an outstanding scholar and citizen.

Faria was called into the service of the United States Army Air Corps in 1943. The shoulder patch on the left sleeve of Faria's dress coat denote the organization insignia for the United States Army Air Corps - a golden winged white star with red center, on a blue background.





Faria was trained as a bombardier and received his wings at Victorville Army Air Field located in the Southern California valley. The two winged propeller lapel pins and the winged bomb breast pin on his bomber jacket denote his branch of service as a bombardier. The single gold bars on the shoulders denote his commission as a Second Lieutenant of the United States Army Air Corps.

Following the completion of his training in Southern California, Faria must have made the journey home to the Bay Area for one last visit in December of 1943. Items found in the pockets of his dress coat included a reservation ticket and envelope for the Southern Pacific Daylight train for the trip from San Jose to Los Angeles dated December 22, and a small Christmas gift tag.





Ranking near the top of his class, Faria was scheduled for special training as a meteorologist, but the need for men in the European theater was so great that in September of 1944, he was transferred to England to serve with the United States Eighth Air Force under the command of Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle. The shoulder patch on the left sleeve of Faria's bomber jacket denotes the organization insignia for the Eighth Air Force - a winged golden eight, encircling a white star with red center, on a blue background.

In the last letter written to his mother, Maude Faria, Bill wrote, "Things have gotten to be routine for us after awhile. Up very early, briefing, and then over Germany again. The operation is very routine but you live a whole lifetime with every mission..."

After flying several missions, Faria was shot down and killed over the south western border of Germany, near Saarbruken, on November 9, 1944. William Faria was the first serviceman from Cupertino to give his life during World War II.

On April 25, 1965, William Faria Elementary School, a newly built school in the Cupertino Union School District, was dedicated in honor of Second Lieutenant William Faria. Mrs. Maude Faria presented a dictionary to Mrs. Mary Hedges, principal, and Ralph Carlson, Cupertino School Board trustee, in memory of her son. Faria School is located on Barbara Lane in Cupertino.

The above mentioned military uniforms, which were once worn by William R. Faria, are currently on loan from our collection to The Museum of American Heritage, Palo Alto. Their current exhibit, entitled "Inventions That Shaped Our Lives: Growing Up With The 20th Century", runs thru May 28, 2000. 
