The Traveling Trunk has been out and about in the community helping students understand the changes that have occurred in the valley over the last 100 years. Frances and Phil Bush, the co-chairmen of the project, and Loretta Bassman have visited six Cupertino schools, since July of this year. They were Dilworth, Collins, Waldorf, St. Martins Church School, Hyde Middle School and the junior classes of the Cupertino High School. The Trunk also visited in the community at the barbecue of the Optimists Club at Sanford Park in Saratoga, the Good Samaritan Church Seniors, and met the Eastside Adult Education group at the Museum. One hundred and six persons enjoyed the trunk presentations.



#### "BEEZ" JONES

"Beez" Jones was born and raised in San Jose and has lived in Cupertino since 1979 when her husband Sam retired from the Navy. She and Sam were active in starting the Certified Farmers Market in San Jose, one of the first six in California. In order to sell produce at a certified market the seller had to be the grower.

Beez' forefathers settled in Cupertino during the winter of 1849-50 and her great grandparents raised wheat, then planted grapes, and finally converted to fruit orchards. Her father was in the canning machinery business when it went from drying fruit to canning fruits and vegetables.

She graduated from Stanford University and later went to work for Macy's on their management training program. She spent several years as a research analyst for U.S. Steel until her marriage to Sam. She is the proud Mom of two sons and a daughter who have delighted her with seven grandchildren.

Beez says she has no time for hobbies because of her many community affiliations. She was appointed by the Supervisor of the 5th District for the study of Stevens Creek Park and County Trails Master Plan. She is a former president of the Cupertino Historical Society and is presently a member of the Northwest YMCA Board of Managers. When she resided in Vallejo Beez was the President of the Vallejo School Board.

She is understandably very proud of her family's long history in Cupertino. Recently Beez discovered a receipt for property taxes paid in 1850 for the property in Cupertino. Her vast knowledge and warm personality make her a very valuable member of the Cupertino Historical Society Board.


#### ROBERT E. VITRO


