## The Past Keeps CHS Moving Forward





## **Joint Meeting Holds Promise for Partnerships**

February's joint meeting between CHS and the California History Center (CHC) proved to be a fruitful one, leaving members from both organizations feeling enthusiastic about working together on future projects.

Each group shared some of the challenges it faces, with CHC focusing on civic education and statewide issues, while the scope of CHS's work is on programs and services within the city of Cupertino. Not surprisingly, each organization strives to maintain its value and relevancy within the community and both find that funding is always an issue.

At the meeting, representatives of CHS and CHC participated in lively discussions about various opportunities to work together. President Mark McKenna suggested the formation of a westside historical group with surrounding cities, allowing for more extensive fund-raising and membership. A universal pass to all organizational events could be issued to each member, but each group would retain its own individuality.

Tom Izu, director of the CHC, said his group could work with CHS on small projects initially, such as guest speaker, oral history and archival programs. Ideas on how the two groups could join together on the Stocklmeir house renovation were also discussed, including a suggestion to create an agricultural timeline. City Manager Dave Knapp explained that sewage on the property is an issue, but the city would be willing to offer some financial aid for the renovation if CHS could come up with about \$300,000.

Both CHC and CHS see the benefit of involving De Anza College students in the historical aspects of the community. The two groups spoke about meeting quarterly and directors Nicole Rau and Tom Izu will get together to further discuss ideas for joint projects. In the meantime, a committee meeting with five representatives from CHC and CHS is planned in April.
