<u>ANNUAL MEETING AND QUARTERLY SPEAKER PROGRAM</u>



On Tuesday, April 17th, 2012, The Cupertino Historical Society held their Annual Meeting and Spring Quarterly Speaker Program. There were 33 people in attendance to vote for the 2012-2013 slate of officers for our Society and hear our fascinating speaker Ray Cosyn present on the topic of Prohibition and its affect upon the Santa Clara Valley.

I found it fascinating that the Sixteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which introduced income tax, was the predecessor to the Eighteenth Amendment which established the prohibition of "intoxicating liquors". The 1913 income tax amendment would make up for the loss of revenue caused by Prohibition beginning in 1919. The only amendment to the constitution that was ever repealed in the United States was the Eighteenth Amendment. Interestingly after Prohibition was repealed by the Twenty-First Amendment in 1933, alcohol consumption dropped significantly. Winston Churchill said it all when he was quoted as saying Prohibition was "a spectacle at once comic and pathetic". Altogether it was a fun and interesting evening.

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SPOTLIGHT CHS Welcomes Darcy Paul to Board of Directors



Darcy Paul moved to Cupertino in 2005, having previously known the city for essentially the same reason that the other 6 billion+ people on Earth know it, which is to say, as the home of the Cupertino Historical Society. 


