hese are exciting times for the L Cupertino Historical Society because we are involved in so many historical things happening and evolving in our community.

Thanks to funding provided by the City of Cupertino, CHS will be working to install signs commemorating events of historical significance that took place along the Stevens Creek trail that runs

through McClellan Ranch, Blackberry Farm, and the Stocklmeir property.

CHS was pleased to see so many guests, almost 300, attend our Winter Speaker Program in February. Brian Liddicoat presented a fascinating historical overview of "The Lost Railroad Tunnels of the Santa Cruz Mountains".

We also had a very successful "International Night" in March that celebrated the vibrant diversity in Cupertino. Over 200 guests attended the event and enjoyed an evening of music and food. Vicemayor, Gilbert Wong, presented CHS with a proclamation for promoting Cupertino's cultural history. The performers were outstanding, and the food was a tasting experience across the continents.

In April the Santa Clara Valley History Collaborative (a partnership of the Cupertino Historical Society, the Cupertino Library Foundation, the Cupertino Library, and the California History Center at De Anza College) arranged for oral histories to be recorded by CreaTV at the Quinlan Community Center. The purpose of this project was to gather the memories and personal stories of local people who have lived in Cupertino and the Santa Clara Valley. By bringing the past to life through video, these memories will serve as a source of information for future generations.

CHS looks forward to our Annual Meeting on May 1 when society members will meet our board of directors and vote on the slate of officers for the 2013-2014 term. Also, Doug McNeil will speak about the history of Monte Sereno, "the serene mountain", and much more.

Best of all, on June 30 we will host our Annual Summer Fundraiser entitled "A Sip of History" at the Picchetti Winery. The theme will be "Stars and Stripes". This will be a celebration of our country with good food, great wine, and wonderful music. I hope to see many of you there.

The Cupertino Historical Society board works very hard to make history come alive. It is people's stories that make history real to all of us. <u>THE SANTA CLARA VALLEY HISTORY COLLABORATIVE</u>

he Santa Clara Valley History Collaborative* held our Silicon Valley Stories Video History Project on April 7, 2013, at the Cupertino Quinlan Center. We gathered memories and personal stories of community members in Cupertino and the greater Santa Clara Valley. The goal of the project was to bring the past to life. It is hoped that these memories will serve as a source of information and entertainment for the community at large.

CreaTV filmed the histories in 20-minute segments. A range of individuals was interviewed. There were youth from our local high schools, former and current civic leaders, and Cupertino Historical Society Board members. A close family member, friend or colleague conducted the interviews. The idea was to achieve a more personal touch in the interview. A DVD copy of the interviews will be catalogued and stored at the Cupertino Library, as part of its California, Western, Americana (CWA) collection and at the Cupertino Historical Society & Museum. Additionally, selected interviews may be included on the Library's website or the Cupertino Library Foundation's YouTube channel. Stay tuned . . .

HISTORIC SIGNAGE ALONG THE STEVENS CREEK TRAIL

key goal of the Cupertino Historical Society for many years has been to create a "Historic Walk" from McClellan Ranch Preserve to the Stocklmeir property along the City of Cupertino's Stevens Creek Trail. The concept is to provide and install signs with historic text and photos along the trail to mark historic sites such as the Doyle Winery, Native American encampments, the Elisha Stephens home site, the Stocklmeir farm house, and others.

To that end, CHS has been working with the City of Cupertino's Parks and Recreation Commission for approval to move forward with the project and with community groups, such as Cupertino Rotary and the Friends of Stevens Creek, for partnerships and funding.

While pursuing our goal, CHS became aware that as a result of the City's McClellan Ranch Master Plan process, the city staff was asked to address a process whereby signage along the Stevens Creek Trail would be upgraded, consistent in format and theme based (historical, agricultural or environmental). We also learned that the City's Capital Improvement Program budget for the current fiscal year contains an item of \$75,000 for use by the Public Works Department for this project. The City plans to hire a consultant for this project by June 30, 2013. The process would be as follows: Develop a theme; Decide location of signs; Design the sign format; Produce the signs; Install the signs.

It is the intention of the City to request input for the planning and design process from CHS and other interested community groups.

For the Cupertino Historical Society, we are delighted that the City has taken on this task and has the funding to implement it. We have on our Board one of Cupertino's historical experts in Gail Fretwell-Hugger (who writes the monthly "Roots" column for the Cupertino Scene). We are sure that she, along with other members, will be able to provide valuable input to the City on the selection of historical sites to be recognized and the placement of the appropriate signage.

IN MEMORIUM

Harlan Ray Bortner September 18, 1934 – February 28, 2013

Harlan Ray Bortner passed away February 28, 2013 after 78 glorious years. He is survived by his wife of 50 years, Eleanor, and their sons, John and Matthew. Born in York, Pennsylvania, to Henry and Anna (Senft), Ray grew up in York and attended William Penn High School, York Junior College, and Michigan State University.

Ray arrived in California in June 1955 for a brief summer vacation and instead settled there. While living in Menlo Park, he met Eleanor Davis, the love of his life, and was married to her in 1962 by his uncle, Pastor Kenneth Senft, at Messiah Lutheran Church in Redwood City. Ray and Ellie lived in Sunnyvale before his job took them to Cape Elizabeth, Maine. After two years, they returned to California in late 1966 and moved into the Cupertino home they've shared ever since. Ray started a career in electronics at Lenkurt Electric before beginning a



32-year tenure at Fairchild Semiconductor in 1961. He finished his career at Flextronics, retiring shortly before his 70th birthday. Ray was part of the high-tech industry from the beginning and remained interested in it long after his retirement.

Ray volunteered at and served on the boards of West Valley Community Services and the Cupertino Historical Society. He was also a docent at the Stanford Athletics Hall of Fame.

A sports fan who was devoted to Stanford athletics – especially men's baseball and football, and women's volleyball – Ray also coached youth sports, served with YMCA Indian Guides, and was active at Immanuel Lutheran Church. He enjoyed gardening, big band music, barbecuing for friends and family, and family reunions in Pennsylvania.

WINTER QUARTERLY SPEAKER PROGRAM

On Tuesday, February 26, 2013, The Cupertino Historical Society held their Winter Quarterly Speaker Program. Brian Liddicoat gave a dynamic talk on the photographic history of the South Pacific Coast railroad line that once ran through the Santa Cruz Mountains from Los Gatos to Santa Cruz. He took us through the line's amazing construction in the 1870's and showed us with a photo presentation, what remains of the tracks and the great tunnels that are under Highway 17 and Summit Road.

He spoke to a very full house of almost 300 people at Quinlan. Many other historical organizations attended including Clampers from E Clampus Vitus of the Mountain Charlie Chapter. This is a colorful group with a sense of humor that believes in preserving California History in Santa Clara County. One example was when they built a monument to Elisha Stephens a true Clamper at heart.

Many lovers of trains or those who just had memories of the days the Santa Clara Valley had trains everywhere, came to hear Brian Liddicoat. I remember my family taking the train called the "Sunshine Special" from San Jose to Santa Cruz for 75 cents round trip. The train dropped us off at the boardwalk by the Carousel and near the roller coaster. His talk brought back all those memories.
