

## EXHIBIT OPENING: "HOMAGE TO THE INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY REVOLUTION"

Our much-anticipated exhibit, "Homage to the Information Technology Revolution," opened on June 19 to great fanfare. The exhibit, which features a small part of the illustrious early technology collection of BasicNet Founder and President, Marco Boglione, centers on the first ten years (1975-1985) of what has come to be known as the Information Technology Revolution. This exhibit would not have been possible without the coordination efforts of Cupertino "Rising Star" and CHSM Board Member, Fabrizio Vitagliano (pictured on the right receiving a certificate of appreciation from Tom Pyke of Congressman Ro Khanna's office).

The exhibit was co-curated by Boglione's chief Curator, Cecilia Botta, with Jennifer Furlong, our Executive Director. Through a series of video interviews with key figures of the IT Revolution guide visitors through the gallery as they discuss the individual machines on display.

This exhibit is notable, not only because it marks a sharp shift in the type of exhibit we have produced, but because of the quality of the artifacts on display. The proverbial "crown jewel" of Boglione's collection, a rare Apple 1 with its original kit (the only one known in the world), is on display with the toolbox that Ste-

ve Wozniak used to build it. Our exhibit marks the first time that these objects have been shown in the United States. The exhibit will be on display, in our museum, until the late summer 2020. Please take the opportuni-

ty to come to the Quinlan Center and experience "Homage to the Information Technology Revolution" before it closes. The museum is open Wednesday to Saturday 10 am to 4 pm and by special appointment. Private arrangements can be made to host your group or organization!

### **OUR 1912 KELLY TRUCK HAS A NEW HOME!**

ne of our prized treasures, the "Kelly Truck," has been rehomed thanks to the hard work and dedication of several CHSM Board Members (Jane Alvarado, Donna Austin, Bill Kerr, Janet Riddell and Suzanne Morrison), community leaders (John Zirelli and Erika Guerra) and local businesses (Recology, Lehigh and Great America Towing). It took lots of ingenuity and teamwork to choreograph the moving of this 1912 treasure from the Snyder-Hammond house to its new home in a shipping container at Lehigh Cement.

A Brief History of the Kelly Truck Mr. Deane was the first owner of the truck – he used it in the fruit orchards. The William H. Butler family of Saratoga, the truck's second owners, donated the 1912 Kelly farm truck to the Cupertino Historical Society and Museum in May 1990, shortly after the Historical Museum opened in the newly-built Quinlan Center. It is one of fewer than fifteen trucks of its kind ever manufactured.

At the time of Butler's donation, the truck was completely disassembled, but with most of its original parts, including the drive train and a copper radiator in boxes ready to reassemble. After a six month restoration by inmates of Elmwood Rehabilitation Center in Milpitas, the truck was returned to us in working order.

After being displayed in the lobby of the Quinlan Center in the 1990s, the Kelly Truck was sealed in a special protective bag and stored at the Snyder-Hammond House. Because of growing concerns for the safety and long-term viability of storage at

Snyder-Hammond, CHSM Board Members have been looking for a secure long -term home, until we have an appropriate space to display it once again.

Lehigh Cement saved the day by offering us a shipping container and safe and clean storage on their property. We owe a great debt of gratitude to Suzanne Morrison and John Zirelli of Recology for coordinating the move with Great America Towing, who donated their services and moved the truck flawlessly! Thank you to all!
