# New Exhibition Opens!

# "Cupertino Crossroads: The Core of a Community" now at Museum!

On the evening of March 31, the Cupertino History Museum (and the Quinlan Center itself) was teeming with people who came to enjoy the opening reception of the Museum's latest exhibit "Cupertino Crossroads: The Core of a Community". Amidst the artifacts, photomurals and engaging text, members and non-members alike enjoyed seeing acquaintances both old and new as they consumed the hors d'oeuvres and drinks supplied by Museum volunteers. A good time was had by all!

The exhibit itself explores the area traditionally known simply as "The Crossroads," where present—day De Anza Boulevard intersects Stevens Creek Boulevard. In the not—so—distant past, the intersection was the real "core" of the West Side community that would become known as Cupertino. The exhibition focuses on the Crossroads of the 1930s, when street-cars rumbled down Stevens Creek Road, bound for San José, Los Altos or Saratoga, and the now ubiquitous automobile was just beginning to proliferate.

The Crossroads of the 1930s were slowly starting to reflect changes that were beginning all across the Santa Clara Valley and the entire nation. The Industrial Revolution was firmly entrenched in the American way of life, and even agricultural communities like Cupertino were feeling the effects. Charlie Baer, whose father had run a blacksmith shop for years at the Crossroads, began to service the many automobiles that began to clatter through the intersection on their

way to picnics at Congress Springs above Saratoga, or shopping sprees in downtown San José. The Cali Brothers of Cupertino, recent immigrants from Italy, had started to establish their feed mill business near the intersection. Business was booming, thanks to the Cali's uncanny business acumen and just plain hard work! The Cupertino General Store, by this time run by Arch Wilson, was still the social center of the burgeoning village. Here, the orchard families of the area could gather to share ideas (both agricultural and domestic); buy clothes, groceries and other important merchandise; pick up or drop off mail at the post office in the store; and even browse for books in the store's lending library that relied on the honor system!

A lot of long hours and hard work went into this exhibit. Members of Cupertino's present—day community unselfishly donated their artifacts, time and strong backs to make the annual exhibition a very special one. A sincere thank you goes out to Linda "I can do that!" 
