Museum Awarded Federal Grant!

Grant Monies to be Used for Educational Outreach Efforts!

The Institute of Museum Services (IMS) announced that the Cupertino History Museum is the recipient of a 1994 General Operating Support grant of \$11,345. Diane Frankel, the director of IMS, stated in a letter that the Museum was one of 300 museums selected from 1,159 applications, and further noted the "museum's success in this competition demonstrates an outstanding level of professionalism among the museum staff."

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The Institute of Museum Services is an inde-

pendent federal agency, part of the National Foundation for Arts and Humanities. It was established in 1976 to recognize the vital public service museums provide as community centers of education and keepers of collections that are part of our cultural patrimony. These funds will be used at the Museum to further implement long-


range education goals, particularly outreach programs to schools and senior groups. The monies may also be used for staff salary support.

The IMS grant to the Museum is the result of an extremely well-written grant application by former museum manager **Judith Mason**. Thank you, Judith, for a job well done!
