



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
New T-shirts & Aprons for sale

What is the "traveling trunk"?


The trunk is a "moveable museum", an important Educational Outreach of our museum. Trained docents coordinate with educators of the Cupertino Union School District to provide adjuncts to classroom curricula.

These traveling exhibits assembled in portable cases explore the history and culture of old Cupertino. They contain objects that can be touched and felt, clothing, tools, timeliness and photographs that make the fascinating stories of Cupertino's heritage come alive.

The Trunk Programs fascinate young and old alike. Docents present a 45 to 60 minute free program to groups up to 35. The Museum's growing educational program reaches students, seniors, and service groups. By word of mouth, the demand is growing.

Our docents, Henrietta Marcotte, Frances and Phil Bush are mindful that as volunteer adults they present other lessons to the students- lessons about what our community is like, and they value teaching history to the school children. It is especially rewarding to present material and artifacts that meet with so much enthusiasm. As former teachers, the Bush's know how much it means to students to be able to touch and handle many articles that they are studying about. What they have read in books suddenly comes alive.

Long-time Society Member Appointed to State Teachers Retirement Board.

On Monday, June 17, 1996, in Sacramento, Governor Pete Wilson announced the appointment of Martin P. Mathiesen to the State Teachers Retirement Board.

Marty Mathiesen has had a long career in education. From 1945 to 1955 he was a teacher and coach at Fremont Union High School in Sunnyvale. From 1955 to 1960 he was principal at Sunnyvale High School. Until his retirement in 1974, he was an assistant superintendent for the Fremont Union High School District.

Marty has served on the board of the California Retired Teachers Association since 1979. He was vice-president, then treasurer, and is currently the budget and finance chair.

With this appointment to the California State Teachers Retirement System (CALSTRS), he joins its 300,000 active members and 130,000 benefactors. He will be one of twelve board members, eight of whom are appointed by the governor.

Zorka Picchetti, wife of Hector and sister of Donna Grce, lived most of her life in Cupertino. She at one time operated a small grocery store in the Monta Vista area with Nellie (Quinterno) Beckstrom. She also worked at the Woelffel Cannery in Monta Vista.

We will miss them both, and extend our condolences to their families.
