MUSEUM RECEIVES IMPORTANT GIFTS

The Christiansen Fund has awarded the Cupertino Historical Society & Museum a \$5000 grant for collection management. SYMANTEC Inc.awarded us funds in the fall to set up a collection data system. Combining these funds will allow the museum to hire a part-time registrar to devote time to management of the collection. Bringing our collection up to date on the data base will enable the Society and Museum to more effectively use it for exhibits and research. The Society and Museum is extremely grateful for the donation because few corporations and foundations support the arts and humanities.

Our collection currently stands at 1100 catalogued historical objects, photographs and documents that relate directly to the history of Cupertino and the "West Side". The collection reflects the rapid changes in the valley from agriculture to silicon chips.

We will be putting our own memorabilia away for our next exhibit Toward the Golden Mountain: the Chinese in the Santa Clara Valley, an historical View. "Our exhibit will showcase the Chinese Americans who immigrated here or were born here, making the Valley a better place. These pioneers have long since died, but they left behind evidence of their lives: Chinatowns; an established agricultural base; fishing companies; canneries; mines; industries of all kinds in this valley...in California. Our story is that of the Chinese American who make the Valley their home.

To quote the curator, John Handley: I am awed by the nameless Chinese people,..who gave everything they had to live here; and by the stories of the Chinese Americans living here today who graciously agreed to share their lives illustrating how history never pauses."

An exhibit such as this is a rich and important one in the community. Several corporations and service clubs have generously underwritten this project. Our exhibit sponsors are PG & E Corporation, Tandem Corporation, The Cupertino Kiwanis Club; The Cupertino Rotary; Quota International, Kaiser Cement Company and Barry Chang, Realtor. Donations from Nicol Lea, Realty, and Cynthia Lee have added to our support We thank them for their generosity. Our great expectation for the this exhibit is to achieve greater understanding of the community as a whole.

On Saturday, April 19, 1997 we will celebrate the opening of *Toward the Golden Mountain*, at 3:00 PM. Our curator, John Handley, will be on hand to guide you through this exciting project. The Chinese Americans who have allowed us to use their life stories in our exhibit will be present in order for you to meet and talk with them. Please plan to attend the gala celebration.




IN MEMORIAM
