Member-Ship A-Sale!



#### Museum Wins Equipment Grant!

Hewlett-Packard Company Employee and Community Programs has announced that the Cupertino Historical Museum has been awarded a new Hewlett-Packard Computer System.

The computer and printer/fax/scanner will be put into immediate use. The new system will allow the scanning of documents from our collection into our data base, give the museum access to a web site and allow us to interact with other museums and other nonprofit organizations electronically. We will use our equipment membership computer for enhancement and control, to print labels and didactic panels for museum exhibits and to publish a quarterly newsletter.

#### The Barbary Coast Trail

San Francisco has a new attraction that is worth considering when you have time to get out of the house and look for adventure. I recommend a full day and good walking shoes. The San Francisco Historical Society, from that beautiful city to the north, is the sponsor of a recently developed Barbary Coast Trail, which meanders for 3.8 miles from the old U.S. Mint near 5th Street and Mission to Aquatic Park.

Twenty historic sites, six local history museums, the three oldest public squares and numerous other interesting locations are linked by a series of 160 bronze markers embedded in the sidewalks, marking locations and pointing the way along the trail.

An unbelievable variety of historical experiences can be expected on this trail. From Old St. Mary's Cathedral, the oldest Catholic cathedral west of the Rockies, to the T'ien Hou Temple, the oldest Asian temple in North America, to Maiden Lane, to Waverly Place, to Portsmouth Square, to Telegraph Hill, to Aquatic Park, and many points of interest along the route, San Francisco's history during the Barbary Coast era comes alive.

When and why was the U.S. Mint built in San Francisco? How did Union Square get its name? Where is the Golden Gate Fortune Cookie Factory? Who was Emperor Norton I? Where was the western terminus of the Pony Express? How did the Old Ship Salon get its name? Where are the "Gates of Paradise?"


If any of this sparks your interest and you decide to walk the Barbary Coast Trail, a guidebook is a must. A short 30 page Official Guide to San Francisco's Barbary Coast Trail can be purchased for \$8.95 at the National Maritime Museum in Aquatic Park. A 247 page paperback by Daniel Bacon, titled Walking San Francisco on the Barbary Coast Trail is available from the Cupertino Library.

To celebrate the California Sesquicentennial, 1998-2000, three annual sets of gold, silver and alloy medallions will be minted. The first set, Discovery, is now available and depicts the discovery of gold. On one side is Sutter's Mill flanked by John Sutter and James Marshall. On the reverse side is the California State Seal. These medallions are available in various sizes and finishes. Prices range from \$7.50 to \$195 for single medallions. The second set theme is Diversity and the third Destiny. #### Save Your Place in History

In recent months several contributors have inquired about the procedure for including the Cupertino Historical Society in their will or trust. We are also asked to address the avoidance of income tax through charitable remainder trusts. These procedures require the advice of professional counsel.

Each individual's case has been unique. Some involve simple cash donations and others have been more complicated, including pensions and real-estate. No matter what the circumstances, our advice is always the same, consult a professional who is well versed in estate planning and tax law.

Remembering cultural organizations in a will or trust will help firm the foundation of the humanities community of the Santa Clara Valley. Museums have been around physically for some time, but their financial base is tenuous at best.

The Cupertino Historical Society's Board of Directors has been considering building its small endowment into a fund to provide financial security for the future rather than living with the realities of year to year general operating expense and exhibit costs. This process takes planning and is being studied by the present board. In the meantime the Society is grateful to receive your gift.
