Museum Wins Equipment Grant!

The Cupertino History Museum has been awarded a Hewlett Packard Vectra Computer and Office Jet Printer and Fax Machine by the Bay Area Contributions Committee of the Hewlett Packard Company. The grant process was started in April and the equipment was delivered in August.

The new computer and printer system will be put into immediate use due to a timely grant from the **Cupertino Kiwanis Club** to buy a software program designed for collection management for small museums. This will allow the museum to continue to document its collection of historical objects and photographs started in 1990. In addition, the new equipment will be used for a database for membership enhancement and control, to print labels and didactic panels for museum exhibits and to publish a quarterly newsletter.(This is the first attempt.)

A Brochure worth singing about!

Meet our New Directors

Born in New York, **Dennis** Cunningham has lived most of is life in California. After he graduated from San Pedro High School he joined the U.S.Navy and served during the Korean War. College in San Jose.

Dennis graduated with a BSEE from Cal State University at Long Beach and worked for TRW in Redondo Beach. In 1971 he moved to Sunnyvale to work for ESL and later moved to Lockheed Corporation where he retired in 1994. Dennis is a 30 year veteran of the *Space Race and the Cold War*

Chuck attended Occidental College and received his law degree from the University of Michigan and is a member of the State Bar of California. At present he acts as Judge pro tem in Santa Clara Juvenile Court, semi-monthly and is a lecturing professor at the Lincoln Law College in San Jose. A Message From the President


A lot has happened in the past few months at the Cupertino Historical Society.

William Conrad "Bill" Ziegler, a resident of Cupertino for 85 years and an important member of the Cupertino Historical Society, passed away August 8. He is survived by his wife, Lucille, daughter, Diane Ikeda, grandson,

James Ikeda, four sisters and two brothers. The oldest of eight children, he grew up in Regnart Canyon and attended the original Lincoln School, Cupertino Union Grammar School and Fremont High School.

At sixteen Bill joined the Merchant Marines and on his return worked at Rifredi's store in Monta Vista. During World War II he worked at Smith Ranch for 4 years, but returned to the store and retired there in 1975. He was given a party on his retirement by the Quinternos.








Francis North & her dolls posing during a photo session for her father, one of the first photographers in the Valley, in the late 1800's.
