

'A CENTURY OF EDUCATION IN CUPERTINO: 1860's - 1960's' THEME OF UPCOMING EXHIBITION

The Cupertino Historical Museum celebrates its second anniversary in March 1992 with the opening of its newest exhibition on schools and education in Cupertino. The exhibition opens with a members' preview on Friday, March 27. The exhibition opens to the public on Saturday, March 28.

Recognizing the important role schools played in the development of the community, the exhibition will look at the change in the schools, the change in the curriculum, the social impact of schools, and will show the history of education in Cupertino. The exhibition will include artifacts, photographs, and a re-creation of a one-room school house interior.
