NOTED AUTHOR/HISTORIAN, AUSTEN WARBURTON, TO SPEAK ON SANTA CLARA VALLEY INDIANS

The Cupertino Historical Society will welcome Mr. Austen Warburton as its speaker on February 23. Mr. Warburton, who is a native of Santa Clara, attended local schools and received his AB degree and JD degree from San Jose State University. He has, over the course of the last 40 years not only practiced law but taught law for 20 years at College of Law at Santa Clara University.

In addition to his legal interests, he has long been involved in the history of Santa Clara Valley, and California, serving on boards of the California History Center, California Pioneers of Santa Clara County, and Triton Museum of Art, among others. He is the author of numerous historical and legal articles and the author of the book, <u>Indian Lore of the North California Coast</u>, published in 1966.

MUSEUM EVALUATED THROUGH MAP I

In June 1992, the Museum was awarded a grant of \$1975 from the American Association of Museums and the Institute of Museum Services, Washington, D.C., for an independent survey of museum operations. On January 18 and 19, the Museum was visited by Mr. Glenn Mason of Cheney Cowles Museum, Spokane, WA. Mr. Mason met with members of the Board, with docents, chairs of fundraising and membership committees, and others, over the course of the two days. He addressed such issues as governance, future direction of Museum, exhibitions, collections management, and operational procedures. He also visited McClellan Ranch Park and the satellite museum at Vallco, to get a well-rounded view of our operations.

In the next 4-6 weeks, Mr. Mason will write a report of his visit and forward it to AAM, who will then send it on to us for our use. This analysis will provide information the Museum can use in its planning. The report, when received, will be available in the Museum, for your use.


AD HOC COMMITTEE ON PLANNING CONDUCTS TELEPHONE SURVEY TO MEMBERS IN FEBRUARY

A committee of five, chaired by board members Sandra Basel and Don Steele, has been given the charge of Museum planning. Included will be an evaluation of progress made on the 1992-93 strategic goals, and identification of strengths and weaknesses of the Museum. In order to answer some of the questions arising about the future of the Museum and to involve Society members in the planning process, the committee will be conducting a telephone survey to members in February. Such issues as funding for the Museum, exhibitions, and what makes the Museum unique, will be among the questions. Your opinion about the future of the Museum is important.
