
MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

HAZEL FRETWELL ENTERTAINS WITH 'TRAVELING TRUNK' AT MAY PROGRAM

On short notice, long time teacher and Cupertino resident, museum docent, and former Society president, Hazel Fretwell, opened up her trunk of historical artifacts and gave an entertaining and instructive presentation of life in an early 20th c agricultural community. A popular presentation for local school children and seniors, since the late 1970's, the Traveling Trunk has visited dozens of classrooms and senior centers in the area. In the past two years, since the opening of the museum, more than 2000 children have learned a little bit of Cupertino history from docents Hazel, Henrietta Marcotte, and Mathilda Sousa, as they describe the use of various objects - from calf weaner to glove stretcher - contained in the trunk.

MUSEUM WILL BE OPEN FOR ANNUAL JULY 4 PANCAKE BREAKFAST IN COMMUNITY CENTER



NEW HISTORICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM PLANNED FOR START OF FALL CLASSES

In association with the current exhibition, "A Century of Education in Cupertino: 1860's - 1960's", a suitcase full of artifacts from early schools, a chronology of Cupertino schools, and reproductions of photos depicting Cupertino schools and education, is being assembled over the summer months. Geared to 3rd and 4th grades, the suitcase of the history of Cupertino schools can be checked out by teachers to use in their classrooms.

The Museum is looking for artifacts to include in the suitcase. Needed are donations of inkwells, quill and fountain pens, readers, primers, slates, school bells, report cards. A MEMORIAL

Historical Society members and friends of Edgar "Bunny" Johnson, mourn his passing. Mr. Johnson, who died in San Jose on May 24, at the age of 80, lived and worked in Cupertino for many of those 80 years. A graduate of Cupertino Grammar School, he was a partner in Johnson Bros. Ranch in Cupertino until it was sold in 1962. He was active in the Rotary of San Jose and a Cupertino Historical Society member.

Old History in New Books

The one-room school house or country school was a type of school seen all across the United States, until the early 1900's when the concept of consolidation and school districts closed many of them. Today they still exist, some as schools, some as community centers, and some as museums. Author Andrew Gulliford, in his new edition of America's Country Schools, traces the history of the country school, including the lives of the teachers and students, the architecture, and the early school curriculum.
