DOCENTS ATTEND NORTHERN CALIFORNIA DOCENT COUNCIL IN SACRAMENTO

Docents Tish Picchetti and Mathilda Sousa attended annual meeting of museum docents on October 5, this year held at the Crocker Art Museum, and have brought back some great ideas for our own Docent Group and for recruiting and retaining new docents and other volunteers.

Along with hundreds of other docents representing 61 different organizations, Tish and Mathilda gained some insight into docent issues. One of many contemporary issues for docents discussed was the importance of outreach to various cultural groups. As an example, in Oakland schools there are many

different cultures, with 69 different languages spoken. To facilitate the docent tours to the Oakland Museum, a video is made of the tour and sent to teachers who review the video and translate it, where necessary, before the students come to the Museum. This helps prepare the teachers and the students for the information they will get on the tour.



Nancy Hertert, a staunch ally of the community of Cupertino, of its environment, history, and the quality of life for its residents, died September 4, after a brief illness. Nancy will be missed for her total, unselfish commitment to the land and to the important place history holds in our life. Among her many accomplishments, for almost 30 years, Nancy worked to create a nature preserve at McClellan Ranch Park...and succeeded. Shorty after the City bought the ranch in 1974 an ordinance passed to ensure its protection as a nature preserve. Today a master plan is being drawn up to further protect the site. In Nancy's honor, a garden of native plants will be planted in the front of the ranch house.


