Historical Society and City of Cupertino Host Unveiling of de Anza National Historic Trail by **National Park Services**

History came alive on February 6, when the City of Cupertino and the Historical Society opened their doors and welcomed nearly 50 history enthusiasts that turned out to witness the presentation of the Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail Comprehensive Management Plan by Meridith Kaplan of the National Park Service. Not since de Anza and his band of soldiers traveled through the area in 1776 has there been such an atmosphere of excitement and pageantry as created by the Museum President Phil Bush accompanied by society members Joe Adamo, Hamilton Ryder, Gary Gennestra and Mike Oliveria who were dressed in full regalia as Soldados se Cueras. (It should be noted that Board Member Jeannie Ryder made many of the uniforms used that evening and more importantly as part of the Bicentennial Re-enactment of 1976.)

The National Park Service.chose Cupertino as the first of a series of public meetings to unveil a very ambitious plan to identify and landmark the historic route that the de Anza expedition took back in 1775/ 1776. Within the United States over 1200 miles of the historic route stretch from Tubac, Arizona to the Presideo in San Feancisco at Fort Point. It was on March 25, 1776 that the de Anza party encamped near Calabasas Creek in Cupertino near the Saratoga border, (CA Historic Landmark CHL800 is located at Monta Vista High School. There is also a re-enactment marker placed at McClellan Park Ranch.)

Board member Steven Haze on behalf of the Society hosted the gathering. Other sponsors included the Heritage Trails Fund's Amigos de Anza and Steve Dowling, Director of Parks and Recreation for Cupertino. Participants included Presidents of various Historical Societies; Parks and Recreation commissioners from nearby communities and Santa Clara County. Many of the individuals there that evening included those who served on Comprehensive Management Plan Task Forces from counties that include the historic route.

Locally, the Comprehensive Plan includes recognition and opportunities for developing the area of historical significance conducted by the Cupertino Planning Commission. The Society's purpose is to assure that the site on top of a knoll near Rancho San Antonio County Park is preserved and made available to the public as a historic site. It was at this site on March 26, 1776 that de Anza, Father Pedro Font and a small contingent of soldiers ascended the knoll and for the first time sighted the southern estuary which later became San Francisco Bay! This knoll is situated on lands of the San Jose Diocese. The Diocese has offered the knoll and its surrounding land to the public as part of a development proposal. From that knoll it is still possible to see El Palo Alto, the landmark 100 year old redwood tree which borders the peninsula cities of Menlo Park and Palo Alto along El Camino Real. El Palo Alto guided de Anza northward as he continued on from Cupertino towards present-day Fort Point at the Presideo in San Francisco.



CAPTAIN ELISHA STEPHENS 1804-1887 A TRUE PIONEER

CAPTAIN STEPHENS BROUGHT THE FIRST WAGON TRAINS OVER THE SNOW COVERED SIERRA NEVADA TRUCKEE PASS WITH NO CASUALTIES-IN THE STEPHENS-MURPHY TOWNSEND PARTY OF 1844, ARRIVING AT SUTTER'S FORT WITH 11 WAGONS AND 51 PEOPLE PLUS 2 INFANTS BORN ON THE WAY, LATER WAGON TRAINS FOLLOWED HIS TRAIL LESS WELL. A BLACKSMITH BY TRADE, ELISHA SERVED UNDER THE COMMODORE STOCKTON IN ORDNANCE IN THE MEXICAN WAR, 1846-1848. STEPHENS WAS THE FIRST AMERICAN RESIDENT TO HOMESTEAD 160 ACRES IN "WESTSIDE" (CUPERTINO) IN 1848 WHICH HE CALLED BLACKBERRY FARM. IN 1859 HE ADDED 155.57 ACRES FROM THE RANCHO SAN ANTONIO, MAKING 315.57 ACRES. HIS FAVORITE FOOD WAS THE EVER AVAILABLE RATTLESNAKE. IN 1862, HE SOLD ALL HIS PROPERTIES TO GEORGE McCAULEY AND WILLIAM McCLELLAN, RESPECTIVELY BECAUSE THE AREA HAD BECOME "TOO DURN CIVILIZED!"
